Georgia possesses rich heritage. The country grows more than 500 varieties of grapes and applies traditional as well as modern wine-processing methods. Every traditional Georgian feast is led by a “Tamada” (the toastmaster) walking you through the unique traditions of culture and history, unfolding the mysteries of survival after many conquerors and binding the guests with warmth of Georgian hospitality. Georgian folklore is known for its complexity and stunning performances and one should not miss an opportunity of witnessing the fire lit on the dance floor.
